









It is realized at Nazareth Academy that education is not merely a matter of academic instruction, but is dependent upon supernatural grace in the formation of true Christian womanhood.



A YEAR OF FIRSTS

Timid at the first sight of Nazareth, self-conscious in their trim new black and white, bewildered by the throngs of upperclassmen, and curious about their future fate at school, eager freshmen, the up-and-coming class of '46 began a year of firsts.
